Today is Mothering Sunday, originally a time when people returned to the church, in which they were baptised or where they attended as children. This meant that families were reunited as adults returned to the towns and villages where they grew up. In time, it became customary for young people who were working as servants in large houses, to be given a holiday on Mothering Sunday. They could use this day to visit their own mother and often took a gift to her. Today, people still visit and take gifts to their mothers. Traditionally, also, during the Lent fast, people did not eat sweet, rich foods or meat. However, the fast was lifted slightly on Mothering Sunday and many people prepared a Simnel cake to eat with their family on this day.

A Simnel cake is a light fruit cake covered with a layer of marzipan and with a layer of marzipan baked into the middle of the cake. Traditionally, Simnel cakes are decorated with 11 or 12 balls of marzipan, representing the 11 disciples and, sometimes, Jesus Christ.

One legend says that the cake was named after Lambert Simnel who worked in the kitchens of Henry VII of England sometime around the year 1500.

The Beacon project has established five well-being hubs in churches, a barbershop, a social supermarket, and a Housing Estate unit to reach individuals from vulnerable communities, and those who are otherwise disengaged from health services for many different reasons. The two church hubs are in St Mark, Kennington and St John, Angell Town. It is good that the local church can be involved in helping to provide for the services that their communities need.
