FOURTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY

THREE things are called "great" in this Gospel: the storm, the calm, and the fear of the disciples. There are many things in scripture which are alien to modern taste and mores. Acknowledging fear in the presence of God should not be one of them. For one thing, we can pile up quotations showing that "the fear of the Lord" is a positive, not a negative, thing: for instance, "the beginning of wisdom" (Psalm 110.10; Job 38.38). In Proverbs 19.23, fear and security are bound tightly together: "The fear of the LORD is life indeed; filled with it one rests secure and suffers no harm."

At every confirmation service, we are taught that "fear of the Lord" is one of the sevenfold gifts of the Spirit. Having "fear of the Lord" does not necessarily mean being afraid of him in the sense of feeling terror or trepidation. People who have transgressed and fear the Lord, like Adam (Genesis 3.10), do indeed feel terror. But there is no reason that terror should be felt by the righteous.

"The fear of the Lord" has two elements to it. First, it is an acknowledgement that his power is real. Second, that acknowledgement shades into the only reasonable response: "fear of the Lord" becomes a virtual synonym for "worship of the Lord". And this worship excludes the worship of other gods.

Mark does not use the regular word for fear, *phobos*, to describe how the disciples were feeling when the storm threatened to sink the boat and drown them all. He keeps it for the emotion that comes upon them after they have been rescued by Jesus's word of power. Nor does Mark use the language of fear when Jesus asks them why they reacted as they did: the English, "Why are you afraid?", is translating a Greek word, *deilos*, which means something more like "cowardly".
